Dear Parents,

I hope you all have a restful holiday over the next few weeks. This is always a busy term (which one isn't these days?) and I am sure the boys will benefit from a couple of weeks off to rest up, enjoy the company of their friends and family and be ready to go again for the summer.

It is this time of year when I officially announce our staffing changes for September. As I have said many times before, recruitment to central London schools, for many, is not always easy. There are not that great a number of brilliant teachers out there for one and the cost of living in the Central London area makes it a challenging exercise...

...not with us though.

The profile of Wetherby is such that we can attract the very best. I always think that the parents should (and do) feel as much part of this School as the boys and it is the same for the staff – everyone wants to be part of #teamwetherby

Lee Reid will start in September as Director of Sport. Initially starting his career at Westminster Under, Lee subsequently moved to King's House and then to his current role as Director of Sport at Orchard House. Lee brings considerable experience and expertise from the London prep school circuit and can build on the success we have had, in what has been a great year of sport for Wetherby Prep. Despite being a Crystal Palace supporter, Lee has formally agreed to support Watford as his second team as part of the terms and conditions of his employment contract.

The Games Department are also joined by **Carl Batchelder** who joins us from Chesham Prep School. Carl is a superb sports coach and has had many years of success getting Chesham to the finals of national competition, even though the school is co-ed. Carl is obviously well known to me, as he currently teaches my boys, Patrick and Joseph, and was a former colleague of Mr Blundell. Carl will also teach History and I have no doubt that he will have a huge impact on life at Wetherby.

Chris Smith makes up a third, additional member of the Games staff. Chris is at the start of his teaching career, having been a graduate sports assistant at Rokeby and Dulwich College. With a background in professional sport, namely football, Chris brings the requisite level of experience, expertise and talent to our Games provision.

Whilst not new to our school, as such, I am delighted to finalise our appointments to the Games Department with the welcome news that **Ben Criddle** is joining us on a permanent basis next term. Formerly at The Gateway School, Buckinghamshire and a 1st Team player for Tring Rugby Club, Ben has been warmly received by boys and staff alike and we are delighted to have him with us as part of our very dynamic Games team.

Iain Goodman will be leaving his post as Head of Geography at the end of this academic year. Iain has had a fantastic impact on the teaching of Geography to all the Upper School boys and this year has taken responsibility and provided excellent support to our Scholarship Group. **Lucy Williams** will take over from him in September, having been Head of Geography and Head of Co-Curricular at Papplewick. Lucy is very well known in prep school circles as an exceptional teacher and schoolmistress. We are delighted to have her amongst our number in September.

As we always knew she would, Rachel Couffignals has become a brilliant mother and understandably wants to concentrate on her family for the next few years. I have insisted that she rings us first when she would like to return to teaching and completely respect her decision to leave Wetherby at the end of this academic year. To take over from her, **Laura Collinson** joins us from Ricards Lodge High School in Wimbledon. Laura is very 'Wetherby' and the boys and parents will take to her instantly. As an experienced senior school teacher, Laura brings excellent subject knowledge, together with a complete understanding of the prep school Common Entrance curriculum from her own schooling. She is a brilliant appointment and we are very excited to have her on board from September.

As many of you will know, Arabella Northey has taken a job as Head of Middle Years at the new Fulham Prep Senior School this September. Arabella has done a superb job with the teaching of RS and English at our School these past four years and all the boys have benefitted from her exceptional classroom practice. She will leave us at May Half Term to take up her new role and **Richard Lock** will join us from September. Richard is currently Head of RS and Computing at Northcote Lodge School and a brilliant and renowned educationalist. He will also teach Maths and is very keen to get involved on the games field! It will be difficult to squeeze everything into his timetable but I do know that the boys will take to him straight away.

I am delighted to be able to announce formally that Emily Trevitt is pregnant and due to give birth to her first baby this autumn. We are all thrilled for Emily and her husband Ian, whom I have no doubt will make excellent parents and ensure that their baby daughter or son is the most well-read child of all time! **Lauren**

Shanley will teach English at Wetherby from September, joining us from her current role as English teacher at Queen's Gate School, having previously worked at Beechwood Park in Harpenden. Lauren impressed us all with her teaching and character from what was a very competitive field this year and we had to turn down a number of similarly exceptional practitioners. Lauren has held specific responsibility for 11+ preparation at Queen's Gate and, being secondary trained, will bring a wealth of experience to the English Common Entrance syllabus.

The happy news of pregnancies continues, with Selina King and her husband Sam, together with Lucy Bassett and her husband Josh, both expecting babies this autumn. Exciting news all round for our friends and colleagues, although we will all miss our new mothers during their maternity leave.

A new member of staff, **Rebecca La Clanche**, is actually having a baby this month but is very eager to get back to a full time teaching job and will join us to teach French and Maths in September. Though latterly working in Dubai, due to her husband's employment, Rebecca has previously worked at St Margaret's in Hampstead. I met her a number of years ago when she was single-handedly developing a house near my father in law's in the south of France. She impressed me greatly and we both feel that it is almost destiny that she comes to work at Wetherby. I just know she will be brilliant - she was described in reference from her time at St Margaret's as, "a superb practitioner...without doubt one of the best teachers I have ever worked with."

With the development of the School at our new site on Manchester Street, **Natasha Aitken-Quack** joins us from Thomas's Clapham to take responsibility for that site and Year 4 classes there. She is an extremely capable educator and the perfect person to establish Wetherby Prep at our new premises. The parents and boys there will benefit immensely from Natasha's capabilities and will also have our existing teaching staff for specialist subjects and be coming together for activities, events, assemblies and Games.

As I said at the start of this letter, school recruitment is not easy but I'm sure you will agree that our staff appointments for September are tremendously exciting and secure firmly our ongoing development at Wetherby Prep – as always, lots to look forward to...


Welcome Danielle Ogden!

Miss Hart writes...

Information on Exams and Assessments

The boys have been exceptionally busy this term and have worked hard. We cannot stress enough the importance of having a good rest and enjoying family time, in amongst some revision. All revision guides have been published on the parents' area of the school website. The password is: Bryanston.

Years 3/4/5

Lower School Assessment Week will run from **Tuesday 2nd May until Thursday 5th May**. This allows for a solid week of revision in school in advance of the assessments, after the Easter holidays. The boys then depart on their various residential trips the following week. With early assessments, we are then able to re-focus the boys and maximise study across the remaining weeks of the year.

The boys will sit exams in the following subjects:

Year 3: English, Maths, Science, History, Geography and RS

Years 4 and 5: English, Maths, Science, French, History, Geography, RS and Reasoning.

Years 6/7/8

Upper School Exam Week (**including CE**) will run from **Tuesday 6th June until Friday 9th June**, immediately after Half Term. **Additionally, please note that for Year 8, the Maths Listening exam will be held on Monday 15th May, the French Listening exam on Tuesday 16th May and the French Orals on Wednesday 17th May.**

Year 6–8 boys will sit exams in all CE subjects. (Year 6 will sit a Science exam, and not separate papers in Biology, Chemistry and Physics).

From the Senior Mistress – School Council

Miss Olney writes...

Last meeting for the term and thank you to Chef Peter for baking the croissants/pain au chocolats for the boys – they loved them (see photos below!) The School Council representatives and PLT have been brilliant this term and are so grateful for all the staff who are so supportive of their initiatives. Some interesting ideas to think about from this week's meeting, well done, boys on a brilliant term's work!

Issues/Ideas brought up during meeting:

- **Goodbye Louis and Samuel** – Both Louis and Samuel will no longer be part of School Council next term and we are very sorry to see them leave. They have been outstanding School Council representatives for 5T and 6B and have contributed some really excellent ideas and suggestions to the meetings.
- **Thank you to Chef Peter** – The boys and Miss Olney would like to say a huge thank you for all Chef Peter's support and help this term. He has been so receptive to the boys' ideas and he is one of School Council's biggest supporters.
- **Form Class Bake Off** – Some of the boys suggested a 'Class Bake Off' competition that could be judged by Mr Baker! Miss Olney will raise this with Miss Martin and Mr Baker about the possibility of a charity competition.
- **Hockey as well as Rugby** – Some of the boys mentioned that they are not very good with contact sports and they understand how difficult it is to staff with the teachers but asked if there is any way of running hockey alongside rugby in the Spring Term.
- **Sugary snacks** – There was a real divide amongst the boys this morning about the raisins as a snack. Some classes really enjoy these but others find the raisins too sugary. Overall, many of the boys were in favour of these so they will continue.

- **Table Tennis Inter-House** – The boys really enjoy ping pong and were very keen on holding a 'Table Tennis Inter-House' where boys could sign up and represent their house. Miss Olney will speak to Mr Billingham about the possibility of setting this up next term and how feasible this is.
- **Sushi making day** – Lots of boys were keen on having a day for sushi making and setting up a station in the Dining Room for rolling sushi. There was quite a divide with this as many of the boys really love sushi but didn't think this could be possible in the Dining Room. This is an idea that might be better suited to post-CE programme for the Year 8 boys and something to look at booking for next year with a sushi making chef!
- **Subject breakfasts** – The boys love the French breakfasts that the French Department puts on but were asking if some of the other subjects could host a breakfast for their subject e.g. Latin/Roman breakfast or even a themed lunch? Miss Olney will raise this with the other subject teachers to see if they are keen on hosting a subject specific breakfast/lunch for the boys.
- **Fish Friday** – Nearly all the boys like salmon and some were wondering if it would be possible to have fresh salmon or smoked salmon to add to the menu on a Friday instead of the breaded fish. Miss Olney will speak with Chef Peter to see if this will be possible.
- **Community Duty jobs** – The boys agreed that Community Duty is really important to the school but feel that there need to be assigned jobs as some boys don't always pull their weight. Miss Olney will meet with the PLT and Miss Clifford to discuss an action-plan for next term.
- **Too many desserts** – The Year 8s still feel that there are not enough desserts at lunch for them on certain days. Miss Olney has asked all School Council representatives to speak with their forms about only taking ONE dessert at lunch and she will speak to lunch duty staff about keeping an eye on this.




Heroes Day

From the Games Department - U10 Rugby Tournament Success

The month of March has been an extremely busy one for the U10 rugby team with three tournaments on consecutive weekends. Our run started with the St James tournament on Saturday 11th March. Wetherby started well and ran out easy winners of their group beating Harrodian 15-0, The Roche School 35-0, and Kew College 15-5. We then progressed to the semi-finals and came through a tough match against the Falcons 25-5, with Chinonso Ogbunude scoring three tries. In the final we were playing Harrodian for the second time, and they had certainly improved since our earlier encounter in the group. Thankfully Wetherby were able to rise to the challenge and tries from Chinonso (2) and Chinua Ogbunude, plus one from Captain Charles Gouilliard, saw Wetherby crowned tournament winners for the first time!



On the following Sunday the boys return to Epsom College for the National Schools Rugby Finals. On their previous visit the team had played extremely well to qualify for finals day, and were expecting a tough day as all the schools in attendance had come through qualifying and were quality teams. The boys quickly found their feet at national level in an exciting 20-20 draw with Chinthurst School, before gaining revenge for a defeat earlier in the season with a hard fought 5-0 victory over Hoe Bridge School. Our next opponents were Wellingborough School from Northamptonshire, it was a very tense and tight affair, but luckily in the last play of the game Joshua Ashley managed to score an equalising try for Wetherby to secure a 5-5 draw.

Our final opponents were St Piran's School from Maidenhead. A strong St Piran's team had won their three previous matches with some skilful passing rugby, and Wetherby were prepared for their toughest match of the day. A brilliant defensive performance saw Wetherby lead 10-5 at half time, but some great rugby from St Piran's gave them a 15-10 lead in the second half. However Wetherby showed great spirit to come from behind and score an equalising try. The game finished 15-15 meaning Wetherby were undefeated on the day. Three draws and one win from our four games was good enough for a second place finish in the group, a great achievement at a national competition.



Our final tournament took place at Merchant Taylors' School on Saturday 25th March. Wetherby started brilliantly beating a good Chesham Prep side 20-0, before defeating St John's, Northwood 25-10. As St Anthony's had unfortunately pulled out of the tournament these two victories were enough for Wetherby to win the group and progress in first place. In the next phase Wetherby were placed with the top teams from the other group but continued their winning ways beating Falcons 30-5, before beating St Martin's, Northwood 20-10 in our final game. Four wins from four games saw Wetherby claim their second trophy in three weeks, the impressive 'Scrummers Cup'.



Overall it has been a fantastic season that will be long remembered. First the team won all their regular season games before playing the three tournaments mentioned above. Despite playing for three consecutive weekends (a total of 13 matches) the boys did not lose once, and won two of the three tournaments. Congratulations to all boys and parents involved!



Cricket Helmets

Mr Billingham writes ...

For any parents planning on buying or upgrading their son's helmet, the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) strongly recommend that school players only wear helmet that comply with the new specification this will be clearly labelled "BS7928:2013" Some helmets are tested with a junior ball (up to Under 13s), a men's ball and some are tested for both. The school would recommend if you are purchasing one, get one tested by both. The school has got plenty of these helmets for the boys that play hard ball to use so please do not feel that you will need to buy one of these.


