From the Performance Corner - Smart Training (HIIT!)

Mr McClinton writes...

Exercising at very high intensity levels interspersed with periods of moderate rest is a training programme commonly known as high-intensity interval training (HIIT). These workouts are typically short in duration and high in intensity. Rest periods are timed and short in duration. Exciting information however, what are the benefits of this type of training?

Research supports HIIT

Growing research highlights the fact that HIIT competes with conventional cardio as an effective and efficient form of exercise providing certain health benefits over and above that of aerobic exercise. Human growth hormone (HGH), known as the 'fitness hormone', has been shown to enhance physical output by stimulating collagen synthesis in skeletal muscle. As a result this promotes muscle strength and exercise performance as well as recovery. Abdominal obesity tends to be low in individuals with low levels of human growth hormone. HIIT impacts all of the above in a positive way.

One particular study reported that 12 weeks of HIIT may result in significant reductions in abdominal and visceral fat as well as increases in lean tissue and aerobic power output. Certain genes, affected by acute bouts of exercise, are the same genes involved in fat metabolism. When exercising, your body almost immediately experiences genetic activation increasing the production of the fat fighting lipolytic enzymes. Insulin sensitivity and blood sugar regulation can also be regulated after several bouts of interval training resulting in buoyant energy levels and appetite stability.

Effective HIIT

- * Warm up for 5/10 minutes; jog, stretch, mentally prepare for exercise
- * Exercise as hard and as fast as you can for 30 seconds. Consider: sprinting, box jumps, ergo (rowing machine) sprints, punching a boxing bag, burpees, sled pushes, stair stepper (machine) etc. You should be working maximally and to exhaustion for 30 seconds. Low resistance, where appropriate, with high repetition is important in an effort to increase heart rate
- * Recover for 60/90 seconds (walking recovery)
- * Repeat the high-intensity exercise and the recovery for a further seven phases. Depending upon your levels of fitness, you may only be able to do two or three repetitions (initially) of the high-intensity intervals. As fitness levels improve, add repetitions until you reach the magic eighth set. Research shows that it's this ratio at this tempo that has all the hallmarks to enhance performance outcomes on a number of physiological levels.
- * Upon finishing, cool down and stretch. This will help reduce the impact of delayed onset of muscle soreness (DOMS). Epsom salt hot baths also support speedy recovery and improved muscle function plus aids with deep sleep strategies.


