In Memory of Graham Taylor

In what has been a twelve month period bringing announcements of an unprecedented number of deaths of high profile people, yesterday's news that Graham Taylor has passed away touched me greatly. Graham was manager of Watford when I attended my first game and during his two tenures at the Club was responsible for many of the most memorable sporting occasions that have punctuated my life over the past 30 odd years as a supporter. He was a brilliant manager but an even more impressive person and everyone could identify and get behind him as someone who represented them as the manager of Watford, such was his sense of decency and strength of character.

My time at university coincided with his difficult tenure as England manager and I found myself fervently defending Graham as a professional and even more so as a person, so underserved and hurtful were the comments towards him from the media and public at large. I only got to meet him once. An ex-Wetherby parent invited me to a lunch some years ago and it was an absolute honour to sit round the table with Graham, his wife, Rita, and a few others, as we all listened to him regaling us with humorous anecdotes on football and also the world at large. Graham was everything I had expected he would be: entertaining, witty, self-deprecating and asked as many questions of me as I did of him. I emailed that parent yesterday, on hearing the news, as I will forever be thankful that he gave me the opportunity to meet the great man. There have been some really heartfelt comments in the media since the announcement but this sums up Graham perfectly for me and in many ways is an observation that everyone, whether interested in football or otherwise, might aspire to:

"He was kind, courteous and considerate. He was interested in you as a person and was totally without ego. He had a very good sense of humour and could laugh at himself. That he loved the game is not the news here. That he survived the evisceration and humiliation of his England reign ending in resignation and came out the other side, still smiling, still besotted with football, still able to meet foe as much as friend in the eye, that certainly is the news. Graham Taylor showed the way to behave, how to treat people and what is really important in life."

Classical Civilisation Club

I would like to salute the old members of our Classical Civilization Club and welcome the new ones, such as: Nicolas Choupak, Milan Escarcega, Maximilian Gardner and Edmund Jones.

This term's main topic will be to **Discover Ancient Rome**. Understanding people in the past can be fun, learning about ancient Rome is interesting and enjoyable. Some kings like Lucius were not very popular and sometimes cruel to people. They became very powerful and conquered other lands. They had patricians who

were rich nobles and owned a lot of land. The plebeians were servants, tradesmen and generally had smaller farms.

This term, the boys will be introduced to various aspects of the Roman Civilization:

Roman History

Humans have lived in the area known as Rome for at least the last 6,000 years. The myth of Rome's beginning tells the tale of its first ruler, Romulus, killing his twin brother, Remus, and naming the city after himself.

Roman Daily Life

Daily life in Ancient Rome often began with a light breakfast. Bread and water (or wine) would be served at home, or a wheat pancake could have been purchased on the way to work or school.

Roman Science

One of the greatest scientific feats of Ancient Rome is the concrete road. Nearly 30 military highways, all made of stone, exited the great city. At one point, 372 roads connected 113 provinces.

Latin Literature

Like today, many Ancient Romans strived to earn a living by writing. Some would read their work in public, like a musician performing on the street, or like an author promoting a new release in a bookstore today.

Roman Architecture

Like art and other aspects of Ancient Roman culture, early Roman architecture borrowed heavily from Greek architecture. However, the Romans quickly adapted their own styles and were soon.

Roman Art

Inspired by Greek art, Roman artists often focused on gods and goddesses, in addition to philosophers, politicians, and other well-known individuals. Artists used various methods to display their work.

Roman Government

While the myth of Rome's origins involve Romulus killing his twin brother Remus to rule Rome and name it after himself, we know that the area was ruled by the Etruscans in the seventh century B.C.

Circus Maximus

Circus Maximus is an ancient Roman chariot racing stadium. It was built on the land between Palatine and Aventine hills in Rome, Italy.

Roman Emperors

Roman emperor was the ruler of Rome during the period of imperial rule. In 27 BC Rome transformed into an empire from republic.

Roman Gladiators

Gladiators were combatants who fought against each other, condemned criminals and wild animals during the time of Roman Republic and Roman Empire.

Roman Mythology

Roman mythology is a collection of traditional stories, beliefs and rituals that Romans used to describe the origin of Roman civilization, culture, history and religion.

The Colosseum

The Colosseum or Flavian Amphitheatre is an amphitheatre built during the time of Roman Empire in Rome, Italy.

Roman Clothing

Romans paid special attention to their clothing and wealthy Romans followed fashion trends of the time. The clothes were designed and marked in a manner that depicted the social status of the man wearing them.

Roman Dishes and Food

Ancient Roman cuisine was influenced by Greek cuisine and later absorbed culinary influence from territories added to the empire.

Roman Houses

Roman housing architecture provides valuable insight into Roman culture, society and history.

Roman Food

Romans normally relied on the traditional food variety of Mediterranean region called 'Mediterranean Triad'. It comprised of olive oil, barley and wine.

From the Performance Corner – Vitamin D

Mr McClinton writes...

Vitamin D is now widely regarded as playing a crucial role in disease prevention and optimal health. It is a fat-soluble vitamin meaning that our bodies can produce most of what it needs via sunlight exposure. Evidence suggests Vitamin D affects approximately 3,000 of the 30,000 genes in our body with gene receptors located on all of our vital organs and tissues. It also has a major role to play both in our adaptive immunity; how our health evolves as we age, and our innate immunity; how we cope with infection and disease. Given the impact vitamin D has on a systemic level, it is important to look at its role more closely.

Sun exposure is regarded as the best way to get Vitamin D. Calcium uptake from the diet takes place in the presence of Vitamin D thereby supporting bone density. Vitamin D also significantly helps with blood sugar issues and energy highs and lows associated with the typical high carbohydrate, western diet. Clearly, over exposure to the sun's rays can cause skin damage. In general there seems to be a lot of public confusion concerning how much sun exposure is suitable and to what degree our skin should be exposed to the sun.

As a guide, 10/15 minutes per day, without sunscreen, exposing at least 40 percent of the skin, is regarded as affective. Our body interacts with the sun's ultraviolet (UV) light producing cellular energy prompting our cells to repair and regenerate. UV light also stimulates endorphins, hormones associated with mood. Consequently, lack of sunlight may lead to feelings of tiredness and apathy. We live in a climate devoid of natural sunlight for several months a year. Blood testing to establish the Recommended Daily Allowance (RDA) of vitamin D is available however, to help optimize these levels, it is vital optimum food choices and dietary supplementation where necessary be implemented.




