First of all a HUGE thank you to Chef Peter who came along to this week's meeting and responded to some of the ideas from School Council. He is always so supportive and there have been some brilliant collaborations between School Council and Chef Peter. Here's to many more!

Issues/Ideas brought up during meeting:

- **Pancakes** – Thank you very much (AGAIN), Chef Peter, for the delicious pancakes, the boys are so lucky to have these every School Council meeting and it makes the meetings more enjoyable.
- **Meetings** – Miss Olney has told the boys that they should assume School Council is on every week (unless they are told it won't be on). There will be a meeting next Tuesday but NO meeting on Tuesday 23rd May due to Lower School residential.
- **Sunny fruits (raisins)** – James mentioned in the School Council meeting that some of the boys didn't like the sunny fruits (raisins) and were concerned about the sugar levels in a packet. James asked if there could be a greater variety of snacks such as fruit instead of the raisins for the break time snack.
- **Year 8 lunch** – There were quite a few Year 8 boys who missed out on the hot dog buns yesterday for their lunch sitting as some boys had taken four in their lunch sitting! School Council have asked Miss Olney to speak to lunch duty staff and boys about not taking more than they should.
- **Friday treat** – The boys love their chocolate treat on Fridays but some of the Year 8s have requested a different chocolate bar (KitKat) instead of Chomps/Fudges as they are getting stuck in their braces. Also some boys feel their peers might be taking more than one chocolate bar so School Council have asked duty staff to hand out chocolates in the lunch queue or once the boys are seated, to hand around the chocolate bars (like Mr Dean does with Year 7).

Action Plan:

Boys will share these ideas with their forms and talk to them more about what was discussed.



From the English Department



In Year 4 Science, the boys have begun their topic on Life Cycles. In collaboration with 'Living Eggs' the boys are going to study the life cycle of chickens and see this 'in the flesh'. At the beginning of the week Mr Tilleray received ten fertilised chicken eggs which we then had to incubate. The boys got to look at this and we discussed the development of the chicks in the egg. From Institutum Studiis Latinis Schola Wetherbiana – Roman Numeric System

Master Vogiatzis scribit...

This week our Classical Civilization Group - VOX POPULI (The Voice of People) - further dived into the Roman Numeric System and they challenged themselves with more demanding exercises practicing their knowledge of Roman Numerals.

The Roman Numeric System

The numeric system represented by Roman numerals originated in ancient Rome and remained the usual way of writing numbers throughout Europe well into the Late Middle Ages. Numbers in this system are represented by combinations of letters from the Latin alphabet. Roman numerals used today, are based on seven symbols.


Symbol	I	V	X	L	C	D	M
Value	1	5	10	50	100	500	1,000

The use of Roman numerals continued long after the decline of the Roman Empire. From the 14th century on Roman numerals began to be replaced in most contexts by the more convenient Hindu-Arabic numerals. However this process was gradual and the use of Roman numerals persists in some minor applications to this day. The boys thoroughly enjoyed the activities and gained house points for their achievement.

What is the benefit of learning Roman Numerals?

Aside from its historical value, seeing numbers represented many different ways is a great way to help the students increase their number sense and better understand how numbers work. Thinking about numbers in different ways can also help them form connections or see patterns. Writing a number as a Roman numeral is just another way to show that various forms can look different, but be equal. Even though the letters used to write Roman numerals represent different values than our base ten system it is still a good opportunity to

point out that where a number (or letter) *falls* has **meaning**. For example, in the number 1,648, the 6 does not just represent 6, it represents 600 because of where it falls in the number.

From the Performance Corner – Chia Choc and Mango snack

Mr McClinton writes...

Using dried, organic mango pieces to naturally sweeten this oat-based recipe, this is an ideal pre/post training snack as well as fuel for the brain. Full of healthy fats as well as quality protein in the form of nut butter (previously written about in the Wetherbuzz), this simple recipe really packs a punch. Adding dairy free, dark organic chocolate to the oat mixture can boost energy and stabilise blood sugar supporting satiety and prolonged focus.

Mangos are rich in vitamin A, C, iron and calcium. They also contain flavonoids – nutrient like molecules supporting the delivery of vitamins as well as their ability to function optimally. Let me know how you get on!

Preparation time – 15 minutes plus chilling time

- Grease a baking tray, line with parchment paper
- Soak dried mango with hot water for 10 minutes, drain, keep the liquid
- Blend dried mangos with mango powder into a paste, add 200ml mango liquid plus olive oil
- Place oats and chia seeds in a bowl. Add the mango puree, mix
- Place half of the mixture onto the tray
- Melt dark chocolate and a nut butter in a pan, pour the mixture over the oat base
- Blend the remaining oat mixture over the top of the chocolate layer, compress
- Firm up in freezer (30 minutes) cut into slices. Refrigerate for 1 week.

Ingredients:

220g oats (gluten free optional)
100g dried organic mango pieces (unsweetened)
1tbsp sweet mango powder
2 tbsp olive oil
1tbsp chia seeds
150g dairy free dark chocolate
100g Nut butter (almond, peanut, cashew nut)








