

From the Senior Mistress – School Council

Miss Olney writes...

As the boys love discussing clubs and school food, I changed the focus this week to 'teaching and learning'. The feedback from the boys was so positive about their lessons which they really enjoy. Funnily enough, they wanted more quizzes/competitions and greater use of the iPads! Food for thought for many of our Wetherby teachers...

Issues/Ideas brought up during meeting:

- **Franchise football teams** – The boys love the cricket franchise teams this term and were wondering if teachers could bring this in for next term and football. Also some of the Year 8 boys mentioned that they would like their Games teacher to be kitted out with a franchise jacket!
- **Clubs** – The boys are quite keen to bring back a few clubs such as Lego Club for a Friday and were even interested in Warhammer Club as an after-school club next term as there are lots of keen Warhammer players at Wetherby!

- **Year 8 Projects** – The 8I boys are really enjoying the Science projects (making bridges and model cars) as part of their post-exam workshops. They thought that more D&T projects should be introduced for the post-CE boys but also to have projects in lessons as well.
- **Year 6 Charity Event** – The Year 6 boys feel a bit left out as Years 3-5 had a 'Wetherby Talent Show' and Years 7&8 had the 'Lip Sync Battle' so they are keen to have an event just for their year group next year.
- **Competitions/quizzes in lessons** – The boys were so positive about their lessons and mentioned that they really enjoy internal quizzes/competitions for the class such as the Geography quiz (to win a KitKat) or the Maths Challenge. They are hoping for more of this in their lessons with more prizes!
- **iPad use in lessons** – The Year 4s have really enjoyed their iPad use in Maths and are keen to have more iPad use in their lessons. They like the games but were keen to get a greater selection of lesson related games.
- **Golden time** – Some of the Year 6 boys are quite keen on bringing in 'Golden Time' like for the Lower School classes on a Friday. The Year 8s were less keen on this but the Year 6s feel it would be a fun way to be rewarded for a good week.
- **Golden Passes** – The Lower School are really enjoying their 'Golden Passes' which Mr Thorne introduced at lunch. They suggested a 'Golden Pass' for each form class rather than just the year group. Also the whole of School Council voted and, both Lower School and Upper School, would like to see the 'Golden Passes' introduced across all year groups.

Action Plan:

Boys will share these ideas with their forms and talk to them more about what was discussed.

- **Franchise football teams** – Miss Olney to speak to Mr Blundell about how practical this would be for next term. Also to discuss franchise team jackets for the teachers.
- **Clubs** – Miss Olney to bring back Lego Club on a Friday and see if a teacher is interested in Warhammer Club during the week.
- **Charity event for Year 6** – Year 6 to brainstorm ideas in their forms and then bring this up at the next School Council meeting. Miss Martin is really keen to organise something for the boys so has left this in the Year 6 boys' capable hands!
- **iPads for lessons** – Some teachers are going on courses and are becoming 'iPad Champions' for their subjects so this will help to bring in more games/apps into lessons.
- **Competitions/Quizzes in lessons** – Miss Olney knows these are really popular and she will encourage Wetherby teachers to bring in new competitions in their subjects.
- **Projects for post-CE** – Miss Olney to raise this with Mr Blundell and see if we can factor in a D&T element next year for the Year 8 boys. Miss Kirby specialises in D&T so is very keen to run a course for this.
- **Golden Time** – Miss Olney to speak with the Year 6 Form Tutors about the possibility of Golden Time for the Year 6 boys.
- **Golden Passes** – Miss Olney has already spoken to Mr Thorne and we are going to trial this for the Whole School after half term.

Next meeting is scheduled for after half term as Miss Olney is away on the Year 5 Residential.

Magister Vogiatzis scribit...


After the scholarship exams, the boys in 8I were taught this week aspects of Classical Greek Philosophy. They were challenged with the ideas of Plato and Aristotle and worked on the ancient Greek influences on the philosophy of religion. More specifically, the boys looked at Plato's theory of forms, his analogy of sight, the analogy of cave and they drew comparisons between Aristotle's and Plato's philosophical viewpoints. The boys were handed a workbook and studied the philosophers' contrasting ideas and perceptions on the physical world and the world of ideas. They were then asked to do certain activities and debate on Aristotle's four causes as well as review and evaluate Plato's ideas on empirical knowledge.

The following is a sample of a task asked from the boys to perform:


Thought Point:

Potentiality: When something contains the ingredients, or potential, to become something else.

Actuality: When an object fulfils its potential and becomes something else.



How does this distinction apply to: An embryo? A computer? A Prime Minister?



Activity:

Take five contrasting objects (for example a pencil case, a sunflower, a horse, the sun...) and apply Aristotle's Four Causes to each one. If Aristotle is correct then it is possible to arrive at an answer to every question for everything in existence.

Stretch and Challenge: Why do you think Aristotle is interested in the question of what causes something to exist?




IAPS Fencing Tour 2017

On the 12th May Wetherby travelled down to Somerset to compete in the IAPS fencing championship. This year's tournament boasted the highest number of entries ever with 47 boys in the U11 epee and 28 in the U14 epee.

The format of the tournament saw the boys split up into pools of 5 or 6 fences each fencing each other. After this the pools were mixed and they did another round robin. Each boy fenced 8-10 in the pools.

After the pool stages the boys were ranked in order to help seed the knock out stages. Wetherby had some success and showed good promise for the forthcoming knockout stages.

All the boys fenced exceptionally well with all but 2 boys making it to the 2nd round. With the field narrowing, only 4 boys made it through to the 3rd round. Both lost close matches and ended up joint 3rd best Prep school Epeeists in the country. Well done, boys!

The U14s faced a similar challenge with two pools and a field of 28. Again with junior British fencers competing, the competition was tough. Sadly, due to the draw, Rupert knocked both Zachary and Marco out of the competition. However the match between Marco and Rupert was one of the best matches of the day going to 9 points each before Rupert pipped it in the last 3rd.

Sebastian fenced superbly, reaching the quarter-finals and Rupert made the semi-finals. Overall, Sebastian finished 7th nationally and Rupert joint 3rd.

What a great day and a huge thank you to the parents who came to support us. We definitely had the loudest cheering section!


From the Performance Corner – A Classic All-Rounder, the burpee

The burpee is the ultimate full-body exercise. It enhances strength as well as aerobic capacity. The chest, arms, quadriceps, shoulders, hamstrings and abdominals are simultaneously worked in this dynamic whole body movement. The burpee is suitable for all ages and fitness levels.

Feel the burn - high intensity interval training (HIIT) is a familiar feature in most gyms and outdoor training programmes nowadays. Studies have shown that the burpee, repeated in sets and repetitions, has the potential to burn up to 50% more fat than certain other forms of training. Calorie consumption at rest also increases. Essentially, the body becomes more efficient at consuming its calories. As a result, food is used as an energy source for growth and repair and is less likely to be stored as fat. The burpee shortcuts you towards leanness! The burpee has also been shown to improve muscle endurance and cardiovascular strength. With increased oxygen demands, improved efficiency, speed of movement and strength endurance, strength gains and defining features becomes more apparent. No need for equipment or a gym membership, the burpee is both challenging and invigorating allowing you to improve upon and maintain fitness levels.

Performing the classic burpee

- Positioning yourself in a standing position
- Drop down into a squat position placing your hands on the ground
- Extend your feet back in one quick motion finishing in the press-up position
- Quickly return to the squat position, one movement, thrusting your knees towards your chest
- Jump vertically raising hands up over your head, land and repeat this series of moves


