Dear Parents.

As the father of two boys and it being some fourteen years since my teaching at a co-educational school, I have not had a great deal of exposure to the sport of netball in recent times. I might have a height advantage but I would get nowhere near the mobility and energy of this super team.

What a fun night and great to be a part of – certainly one of the highlights of my year. After two years of running the Prep and Senior Schools, I truly hope that the partnership and collegiate nature exhibited by the Wethergirls Team is something that will continue for many years to come.

Performance Corner - Gluten, the facts

I am aware that I have commented on this topic previously. Let me start by saying than many people don't have an issue with gluten in their diet. Gluten is a protein made from two molecules, glutenin and gliadin commonly found in wheat, rye and barley as well as processed foods.

The word gluten comes from the Latin word glue; a binding agent in bread. These same binding agents can actually interfere with the breakdown and absorption of nutrients in food. Undigested gluten acts as a trigger in the immune system attacking the lining of the small intestines. This in turn can lead to malabsorption of nutrients and consequently nutritional deficiencies. The may also cause an array of other related health issues concerning the skin, liver, joints and nervous system.

Wheat

Wheat is one of the most widely grown crops in the western world. Modern wheat is vastly different from the wheat our ancestors consumed. The proportion of gluten protein in wheat has increased considerably as a result of wheat crop hybridization (a type of cross breeding). This may account for the rise in gluten intolerance since the 1950s. Pure wheat flour has been milled into refined white flour only during the last 200 years. Those with a gluten issue can be affected by a molecule called zonulin, a protein that triggers the opening of junctures between the cells in the gut lining. In essence, this makes the gut more permeable or leaky. Food particles can therefore access the bloodstream causing inflammation and immune reactions.

The Crop Spray – Glyphosate

Research has shown that glyphosate, one of the most widely used crop spray herbicides, has been shown to severely damage gut flora, an issue rooted in gut dysfunction. The use of glyphosate has risen with the rise in celiac disease. When wheat is exposed to a toxic chemical like glyphosate it actually releases more seeds. This results in slightly larger yields, clearly more profitable to the farmers. It also means most non-organic wheat and all the processed foods that contain it are contaminated with glyphosate. Gluten in particular proves extremely difficult to break down and digest. Glyphosate interferes with the protein connections making wheat highly indigestible and more likely to cause an immune reaction.

The Milling Process

Historically flour was mixed with water and yeast and the dough was left to rise overnight. This process allowed enzymes in the yeast to break down gluten. The addition of various chemicals has cut down the process to about two hours, which is not long enough for the gluten to be broken down. Hence, most bread today contains far more indigestible gluten than breads in the past. Problems attributed to gluten may therefore be related to the chemicals used during the processing of refined wheat flour than to gluten itself. A lot of the nutritional content of the wheat kernel is removed during the milling process stripping much of modern day break and wheat based foods of their nutritional viability. This allows manufacturers to produce a cheap, easy to sell, longer shelf life product. Our bodies consequently lack the enzymes to breakdown much of these non-edibles.




