From the Classics Department—The Jowett Sendelar Classics Essay Competition

Magister Vogiatzis scribit:

Acta Diurna (aka Daily Public Records)

The Wetherby Prep Classics Department would like to invite **Year 6, 7 and 8** students to participate in an exciting Classics Competition, the **JOWETT SENDELAR ESSAY COMPETITION**. The topics as well as the application process have just been announced and deadline is the **31st of January 2018**. I would like to encourage as many students as possible to participate in this prestigious competition, one that will help the students develop their analytical, thinking and writing skills when researching on Greek and Roman Mythology and Civilization. Details of how to enter are below, good luck!

For Year 9 and under: approximately 1500 – 2500 words. Illustrations (with captions) are welcome.

a) GODS: Which can tell us more about Greek and Roman religion: written sources or physical artefacts? *You should compare the knowledge of the gods we get from writings such as Ovid's Metamorphoses with what we discover from temples, statues, and Greek pottery. You should include specific examples from both types of source, and reach a conclusion.*

b) EPIC: 'Female characters in ancient Epic poetry contribute little to plot, themes, or characterisation'. To what extent do you agree with this statement? *Consider the importance of female characters in Epic. You should refer to a range of characters from at least two Epic poems (such as Homer's Iliad, Homer's Odyssey, and Virgil's Aeneid), and argue how important they are to the plot, themes, and characterisation of those poems.*

c) HISTORY: Was the eruption of Vesuvius in AD 79 a terrible tragedy, or should we be glad that it preserved Roman towns and villages for us to study? *You should consider what was terrible about the disaster, and also think about what modern knowledge of the ancient world gains from Pompeii, Herculaneum, and the other settlements and buildings preserved by the eruption. The accounts of the eruption by Pliny the Younger may be useful to you. You should present your findings in a format of your choosing (e.g. an essay, a drama, a letter, etc.).*

d) TRAGEDY: 'Putting on Greek Tragedies in the modern world is a pointless act, since these plays have no relevance to a modern audience'. How far do you agree with this statement? *In your answer you should refer to at least two Greek tragedies, and consider to what extent they contain themes, characters, and plots that are relevant to modern culture.*

e) SPORT: Gladiator games were banned in AD 404. Should they have been banned sooner? *You should consider what was good and bad about gladiator games, and refer to specific examples of benefits and problems. You should reach a conclusion as to whether banning gladiators as entertainment would have been a good thing.*

Submission of entries for 2017-8 Competition

Candidates must put their **name, date of birth** and **school** on the FRONT COVER PAGE of their entries. This information should NOT be placed on the pages of the essay itself. The judges would like to see a bibliography or a list of the sources consulted. A word count should also be given. Entries may be submitted electronically (preferably), or by post.

Electronic Submission

Entries should be submitted in Microsoft Word format only. Please do not use difficult fonts (e.g. all capitals). Entries should be emailed as attachments to jowettsendelar@boltonschool.org with the email subject 'Jowett Sendelar Competition Entry 2018'. Please include the address of your school in the email for the mailing of any prizes awarded.

From the RS Department—Common Entrance Revision

Mr Lock writes...

All boys in Year 6, 7 and 8 follow the Common Entrance course for RS. This develops their knowledge understanding and evaluation skills when looking at both biblical texts and the moral and social issues which are discussed.

There are 12 key Bible texts which pupils need to know in depth in order to develop these skills. I have presented these in a core text book which also contains some of the commentary notes to go with each story. This book has been printed and given to your son but is also available as an iBook for those with an Apple device and as a PDF for Android devices. It is one of a range of resources which I will be sharing with the boys over the coming months and is useful tool which will be helpful when completing homework or revision activities.

How to ... Improve Speed

By training your muscles fibres to respond to load and time under tension, you have the capacity to shape your performance and training outcomes. If improved speed is something you want to achieve which is important for this term, the football term, these simple but effective training drills can help you achieve your goal.

Knee pickups - raise alternate knees to waist height whilst jogging for approximately 10m. Focus on your arms and elbows in a pumping motion keeping your elbows at a 90 degree angle and your shoulders tension free. Make as much ground contact, leg speed, as you can. Walk back to starting position and repeat this drill.

Tuck jumps - squat down then jump straight up as high as you can. Whilst in the air, drive your knees up and into your chest, land smoothly in the straight leg position, squat immediately and repeat. Repeat this whole body movement for a number of sets and repetitions with a focus on leg speed and ground contact time.

Rocket jumps – squat down then drive up from the floor jumping with straight legs into the air. Stretch your arms up (straight) above your head. Your body should be as tall as possible at the top of the jump. Land evenly on both feet, squat and repeat. The emphasis here once again is speed of movement and as little ground contact time as possible.

Skipping - skipping increases sprint speed. Use a suitably adjusted rope, start with the rope just behind your stationary feet as you position yourself in a poised stance before your first rotation holding the skipping rope in left/right hand.. Complete one full rotation of the rope, up and overhead, skipping over the down turn of the rope. Repeat this motion with a focus on both speed and timing.

Oscar and Lucas interview Lorenzo Quinn

Oscar (6T) and Lucas (6M) were very lucky to have the chance to meet and interview artist Lorenzo Quinn over the summer. The boys played chess on top of Lorenzo's sculpted chess boards and had a guided tour of his Stardust exhibit. In Venice they enjoyed seeing the 'Support' sculpture and witnessing the rising water levels of the environment caused by global warming. Well done, boys!



Here is a extract of their interview with artist Lorenzo Quinn;

Enjoying the Stardust Exhibition ...

Oscar: Why do you like to use hands in your sculptures?

LQ : My sculptures carry messages that I would like everyone to be able to understand. Hands are universal and unique to human beings. These are the hands of my son, he is 11 year olds and they represent the future as children are the future.

Oscar: How do you produce such large pieces of artwork?


