### From the Headmaster

#### Dear Parents,

Long-time readers of this column will appreciate that sometimes, but only sometimes, it can get to a Friday afternoon and I'm struggling for inspiration as to what to write. Last week, I knew I wanted to communicate in a more formal way about such a huge change to our weekly practice with the changes to Friday Clubs but it wouldn't be the Wetherbuzz without some offbeat nonsense, so I relayed the changes to my dietary programme for these weeks leading up to the London to Paris bike ride. A relatively flippant remark, I thought, but a remark that, this week, has been met with probably the most powerful response to any comment I have made in all these years; thank you for your support, encouragement, recognition and, in one parent's case, some delicious grain-free muffins to make up for my peanut and cheese abstinence!



This week, I knew the topic on which I was going to write but yesterday was slightly scuppered by famed educationalist and long-standing friend to our school, Dr Antony Seldon, who spoke most eloquently on television about the dangers of and over reliance upon mobile phones by young people and the adults they become. He said, quite rightly, that people today can't read maps and the danger is that modern media could render us 'infantile'. I agree completely. I didn't think I'd miss it.

So, as much as I agree with Antony and am clearly in danger myself of the perils he identified, you will now understand it is with a certain amount of trepidation that I announce that this time next week, our Friday Assembly will be LIVE from my office and available only as a live feed on Instagram. I doubt that Antony reads this column but, if he does, I know he would let out a massive sigh in the light of this. However, as the Church of Annunciation is still out of action and the Hall at Hannah House is given over to our friends at Wetherby Senior for their GCSE exams, we will try something very modern indeed.

Miss Ogden writes...

It's been a while since I've done anything mentally or physically challenging (or stupid!) and back in November last year I was saying to a friend that we should look at 'doing something' when, the following week, an email came round the school saying that Mr Lock is organising a London to Paris bike ride for Parents and Staff. Perfect! Whilst I was thinking more along the lines of rambling around a 5k course with my pet pooch this sounded like a much more interesting challenge. Sorry Tallulah, maybe next year! With an encouraging "Come on Ogden if I can do it you can" from the Headmaster I decided to sign up.

There were a few complications. One, I didn't have a bike. Two, I've only cycled on the road once in my life. Three, whilst I am a pro at Centre Parc cycling I have never ridden further than a 10km track in Thetford forest! And fourth, did I mention I didn't own a bike?!



There's also the slight set back that this time 18 months ago I was completely incapacitated and in a wheelchair with a very badly broken foot. After a trampolining accident at the end of October 2016, one bounce, three broken bones, two dislocated bones, two operations, six months in a boot, eight months on crutches and one year of physio, the thought of doing something like this not even two years on was unthinkable. There were times where I thought I wouldn't be able to run for a bus again but the body is an amazing thing!

So after purchasing a beautiful bike and with the British weather finally heating up, (sort of), the training started in earnest about a month ago and last weekend I managed by biggest ride yet with 3 hours in the saddle and at least 20 miles ridden. My app stopped half way round, I'm pretty sure I rode more but I'm feeling modest today. I still have a long way to go but I'm very much enjoying this challenge and, of course, it's all for a good cause.





#### **Out of School Achievements**

#### Andre hits a homerun!

Andre plays for the Milwaukee Brewers in the London Sports Majors baseball league arranged by the American School. He has played with them for about five seasons now and this is the first year in the Majors. There are several other Wetherby boys who play in the London Sports baseball league from various different years and it great to see the sport growing in popularity amongst the Wetherby boys.

On Saturday 28th his team played against the Kansas City Royals and the Brewers won 11-9 in a tightly contested game. Andre scored 2 RBIs which made all the difference between a draw and the Brewers winning.

On Sunday 29th his team played against the Toronto Blue Jays and the Brewers won 9-7. This time Andre scored 3 runs helping to make all the difference between a loss and winning the game. This was a real success, particularly as Andre is half-Canadian. Well done, Andre!



#### Nadhmi's Success at World School Chess Championships in Albania

Over nine full days of matches, each against a different country, Nadhmi (6T) took on the very top players from all around the world. He was paired against the number 1 seed - a boy from Kazakhstan whose FIDE grade is 600 points higher than his. Nadhmi was actually winning that match the entire way but his opponent forced a draw through 3 move repetition - still an absolutely fantastic result against the top seed. He also was paired against seed 3 and 4, and a few others from the top 10, which brought him some great wins - one of his wins was against a Bulgarian Candidate Master!

All in all it was a gruelling tournament with most games lasting at least 4 hours and a few even hitting the 5 & 1/2 hour mark! Not to mention the several hours of game preparation beforehand. A real marathon battle!

Nadhmi was honoured to represent England and did brilliantly, ending up on 5 points out of 9. The winner got 7.5, so this was a very impressive result, particularly for his age range. All in all it was a fantastic tournament, Nadhmi played some absolutely brilliant chess and took on some of the biggest names in the chess world for his age, even beating a fair few of them too! It was a truly remarkable what he has achieved. He's done the England chess team very proud indeed and we are all very proud of him at Wetherby. Well done, Nadhmi!


