

We had our penultimate School Council meeting on Tuesday this week and it was great to have the Year 8s back after their residential trip.



He was held at Prisoner of War Camp Stalag Luft 3 (which is where the great escape happened two weeks prior to his arrival). The boys were memorised by this story and asked many interesting questions and the feedback I received about the talk was fantastic.

Thank you very much to Mr Terry Fenner-Leitao (George, 5K) who helped organise this talk and brought Mr Birchall up to London for his visit. It is an experience the boys will not forget.






On June the 10th, England will take on Paraguay in their opening match of the World Cup. You can guarantee that the following Monday, the conversation in schools will be of little else, so if you want to hold the attention of a class, you will have little choice but to link your lessons to the football. Fortunately, there is plenty of good material to work with.

After the first match, speculation will be rife about whether England will make it through to the next round, and if so, who they will be playing. This talk of permutations and what-ifs is, of course, maths, and gives you a perfect excuse to build simple decision trees to investigate the possible outcomes.

Football league tables also make great deductive puzzles. After a couple of matches played in a league, it is almost always possible to deduce the precise results of all the games played so far, simply by looking at the table. Even if you delete some of the entries in the table, a unique solution is often still possible. For example, here's how England's table might look at the end of their group stage (wistful thinking, perhaps). Half of the entries have been deliberately blanked out, yet incredibly it is still possible to deduce the score in each of the six matches:


