
## **Mrs Tomsett-Rowe writes...**

### Issues/Ideas brought up during meeting and action plan:



## Planet and Star Competition Entries


Just to let you know that I selected at random and have entered the following children in to the competition that I mentioned a few weeks ago:

Harrison Burns, 5K, decided on 'Plot' for the Exostar to *make it sound different from the sun and to help us with directions in the universe*.







# Music Department


