From the Headmaster

Dear Parents,

Two weeks at Autumn Half Term is always welcome and I trust everyone made good use of the time. We did indeed manage to finalise 80 Year 6 references and if I say so myself, I think we've done a brilliant job with them. Our Year 6 boys can go into next week's ISEB CPT fully confident in the knowledge that they have the complete support of their school.
