From the Headmaster

Dear Parents,

A question I get asked from time to time from prospective parents is, "What proportion of the school population is British?" This question rarely, if ever, comes from those with obvious British accents or surnames, maybe they feel it's irrelevant or not important to ask but I think it's almost certainly as they don't want it to be perceived in any way to be xenophobic or racist. For me it's an easy question to answer even though the answer is a complex one. I don't really know how we define 'British'. Is this, who owns a British passport? If so, it's 100%. Is it parentage? That's not quite so clear cut. What I am always keen to point out is that even if boys' parents were born overseas, over 80% of our boys were born in London and consider themselves Londoners. They support London football clubs, like Chelsea (and Watford) and want England to win in major sporting events but I have to say I was surprised to realise a number of years ago at Prize Giving, how many didn't know the words to the National Anthem.



I'm not a big national flag waver and as much as I believed that staying in the EU was the best thing for the UK a few years ago, the political log jam, infighting and disingenuous attitude from both the EU and the UK over the past couple of years now has me looking forward to a new United Kingdom. I think we need to be prepared for a tough economic situation in the short term but after a few years, I think the UK will re-establish itself as a major world economic power and hopefully, invest heavily in the nation as a whole, parts of which have been long forgotten by the UK itself. London will always remain a favoured destination for many and a successful city, somewhere I am always proud to say where I work in and once lived and studied. Hopefully, in the next few years, we can all look outside the London bubble and be proud to be British again and be part of a nation that stands up for itself, lives up to the values that many feel it had/should have but has been lost in recent years.

Another question from prospective parents is, "What proportion of the staff are male?" But maybe we've had too much politics in this column for one week!

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

Art Day



Year 3 and 4 boys enjoyed a cross curricular 'Art Day' on Wednesday. Boys completed a range of creative activities linked to their other lessons.

For any parents planning on buying or upgrading their son's helmet, the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) recommend that school players only wear helmets that reach the British Manufacturing standard "BS7928:2013" Some helmets are tested with a junior ball (up to Under 13's), a men's ball and some are tested for both. The school would recommend if you are purchasing one, get one tested by both. The school has got plenty of these helmets for the boys that play hard ball to use so please do not feel that you will need to buy one of these.

Skool Daze



This week, it is the turn of our Head of Art, Miss Kirby!

Where did you go to school?

I went to lots of different schools. My parents moved house every couple of years. I was in Dublin until Year 3 and then the Isle of Man, Windermere and finally the Malvern Hills in Worcestershire.

Which was your favourite subject and why?

Art has always been my constant, no matter where we moved to I always had my artwork and pile of sketch books. I still take a sketch book with me wherever I go today.

Who was your favourite teacher and why?

I had a wonderful Art teacher called Mrs Rowberry. She gave me the keys to the Art building when I was 13 and I spent all my spare time in there. We remained close until she died. She was constantly nagging me to leave museums to put on exhibitions of my work.

What was your most memorable trip/residential?

I went to the Gower Peninsula in Wales with the other A-level students in my class. We spent a week in the blustery cold winds recording the textures in the rocks, the colours of the seaweed and lichen and watching the sea roll in. What didn't you like about school?


