From the Headmaster

Dear Parents,

Thank you to everyone who watched Assembly this morning. That was great fun to do, particularly with the (initially very camera shy) family. I had brought home a full uniform for Joseph to wear...but understandably he didn't want to get too carried away...maybe after Easter...

We then had Irish Dancing with the Maguires this afternoon. Cravenly, I muted my outgoing video feed but I was so impressed to see boys, parents and staff dancing along to the instruction – great to see. Continuing the interactivity, Chris Thorne and I will be starting our 'Daily Quiz' later this evening on Instagram at 8pm. Think HQ Trivia (remember that?) meets Family Fortunes; this will run throughout term time isolation, if enough demand!



It's the holidays but in many ways, nothing really changes and though we won't be posting any schoolwork, Ms Russell has put together a programme for the boys to follow over the holiday to keep them occupied. As I said in my email last night, next term will look different; I have also written a FAQ section below which hopefully answers and responds to all the queries that have come up this week. A number of you have said to us that your sons miss a focal point at the start of the day, therefore we have built in a 'Thought for the Day' segment which will be live on Instagram every day at 9 next term. There will also be a 'theme' for the week that the boys can address alongside normal learning; this will then become the focus of the form period on Friday afternoons. The lessons themselves will be a mixture of video conferencing and set activities but with a clear timetable so nothing is competing at the same time and there is a range of activities and tuition for the boys to engage with. We will also have a full programme of Clubs between 4 and 5pm everyday, much along the lines of Mr Maguire's session earlier today. As I said last night, it will be imperfect but is, we think, the best way to teach and engage the boys with our exiting capabilities in this unprecedented time for all schools.

At this time of the year, we announce the staff changes for September which I detail below:

As one of our founding members of staff in 2004, **Madame Aude Sebag** will be retiring at the end of this academic year. Aude has given so much to the School and seen it grow from when she used to come in on one-morning-a-week to teach the boys. We, of course, wish her well in her retirement and will always consider her one of the school's dearest friends. The role of **Head of French** is taken by one of our current French teachers, **Mrs Lucy Bassett**. Lucy has worked at Wetherby Prep since 2006 and is well known to many of you. I have no doubt she will continue to promote French and develop the department in the coming years.

Mrs Laura Harris, currently on maternity leave, will be leaving the school at the end of this academic year as the family has moved to Henley. Laura has been a superb Head of Science but we completely understand her decision to leave the capital. Throughout the year, the Head of Science role has been in the very capable hands of Miss Emily Casserly and the 'acting' role she currently holds will be permanent from this September.

With Mr Richard Lock and Miss Gayle Russell occupying senior roles within the school, we have promoted current English teacher **Miss Cecilia Bidie** to the role of **Head of TPR** (Theology, Philosophy and Religion) for September. Cecilia will continue to teach some English but will take responsibility for TPR across the age range, something that has been a passion for her ever since studying for her Theology degree at the University of Edinburgh.

Miss Phoebe Amato-Pace will be leaving us at the end of this year to take a class teaching role at Ravenscourt Park in West London. She has done a great job this year as **Head of History** but feels she wants a return to whole-class teaching, which we, of course, respect. One of the strongest recruitment processes we have lead in recent years produced two very strong candidates and we were delighted to appoint **Miss Louise Kirk**, currently History and Classics teacher at a state school in south London and previously at St Christopher's Prep in Brighton. Louise will take the Head of Department role and teach some Classics. Additionally, it was essential to find a role for **Miss Jessica Cox** who we all thought was one of the strongest NQTs we had ever encountered. We couldn't miss out on staff of this calibre so *had* to hire them both!

With our new Drama Suite proving so popular with the boys, we have appointed **Miss Zowie Wood** to a new role for us as **Head of Drama**. I really can't wait to unveil Zowie to you – as a teacher and a character – she will bring so much to Wetherby Prep and really enhance our Performing Arts provision. As Mr Blundell said as Zowie left the school after interview, "Wow, she was box office!" She will be brilliant.

Mr Chris Smith will be leaving the school at the end of this academic year as he has secured the Head of Football post at Radnor House School. Many congratulations to Chris who has just presided over the strongest 1st XI season one can remember. We have appointed **Mr Greg Trencher** as his replacement to our Games staff. Greg, currently working at a state school in South London, was very impressive at interview and lesson observation, so much so that the boys he taught followed Mr Blundell around that day encouraging him to appoint him not your decision boys but thanks for the recommendation!

We are delighted to appoint **Miss Caitlin Sheldon** to our **Maths** teaching staff in September. Caitlin currently teaches Maths at Alleyn's School and is an excellent educationalist and school mistress. She is very Wetherby Prep and knows the school well through her friendship with Miss Aitken!

I say it every year but this more than most, I am so looking forward to working with our new staff in September and know they will all improve and develop our already first class team at Wetherby Prep.

Remote Learning - Frequently Asked Questions

This week was always going to have an element of the experimental and we have quickly learnt what is and what isn't possible in terms of what we can offer going forward, if, as expected this remote learning is to continue after Easter. We are planning half termly at present, this may turn out to be optimistic but is how we will plan the schedule going forward.

Exact details and timetables will follow prior to next term but the following should answer most of the common queries. These are not actual questions raised by parents but amount to similar queries fielded this week:

'My son is really struggling with the workload. Does he have to complete all tasks?'

Health and happiness is the absolute priority at this time and if completing all the work is proving too much for your son then of course, no-one is going to chase him for work he hasn't completed. One thing we are planning for next term is a slimmed down timetable that focuses more on 'lessons' than 'set activities'. We are of course, delighted that many boys have 100% submission rates across the curriculum and encourage them to keep at it.

'Show My Homework is a Homework application, can't we move to a more formal intranet?'

We agree, SMH is not designed for a complete remote learning provision but it is fulfilling a role here and is the platform that most boys are familiar with. We do have the full suite of Office365 applications and could give all boys a login but this is a lot of change management that we would have to do remotely. As many of you know, the plan is to give all boys in Years 6-8 a Surface Go device in September which all links to the school network. Unfortunately this roll out will come one term too late to help us with the current predicament.

'My son cannot submit a task on SMH'

This will almost certainly be because he is logged in as a parent and not the pupil. Parent logins are just for information, only the boy's account has full functionality. If any parent is still having issues, please email Mr Lock – richard.lock@wetherbyprep.co.uk and he will call you to troubleshoot.

'My son loved the Zoom lessons, can we do more of them?'

Yes we can and will timetable these next term. We are conscious that we have had lessons and form times competing for Zoom time this week and boys are pulled in different directions. This will be cleaner and more straightforward next term. Form periods will all be done via Zoom.

'My son doesn't have a laptop/printer and/or there are not enough laptops in the household to facilitate remote learning.'

This is probably the most common issue. We will open the school on Monday 20 April for any parent that wants to borrow a school laptop. Please email $me - \frac{nick.baker@wetherbyprep.co.uk}{metherbyprep.co.uk}$ and we can arrange a time to pick up a device. One of the things we are looking at over Easter is to minimise the need for anyone to print anything. We appreciate that this is causing unnecessary issues at home.

'Will the boys still be doing exams?'

We are going to postpone lower school exams and do a full set towards the end of the autumn term. It was our intention to try and administer these remotely but this just complicates an already complicated issue. At this stage, we will still facilitate Year 8's CE exams, even if the boys are not in the school during the week after half term. Obviously the integrity of the exam conditions cannot be assessed but we trust our boys and if they want a grade at the end of their time at WPS, we will gladly email them, get them emailed back, mark them and provide a certificate. Please note though, this is entirely optional – if the boys do not want the stress of upcoming exams they can opt out. We think though that this should be entirely possible and a good way to keep the boys focused over the coming months.


5-6, Non-Screen Fix


IMDb synopsis:






Dear all.




