# From the Headmaster

Dear Parents and Boys,

Well that was a half of term like no other before it. As a school we have asked a lot from our boys, parents and staff but everyone has delivered; I'm incredibly proud of how we have collectively navigated these past five weeks. There has been the education of course, the pastoral support, assemblies, clubs, quiz nights, music concerts, fundraising events, chess matches – much like a normal Wetherby Prep experience, just different...



As I have touched upon in my daily emails, this period has changed the way we look at educational provision and though hopefully there will never again be such an extended period of 'remote learning' in this way, there is so much that we already do that can be enhanced by the use of technology. Many of you will know that the plan was to provide every boy in Years 6-8 with their own Surface Go machine from this September. We have subsequently reviewed that plan and intend to provide **all** boys in the school with a device this September. This is not because we fear another virus but because we feel that the 'Teams' platform has so much to offer and improve our normal practice. Speaking to many of you this term and when observing the lessons, the boys, even in the youngest years, have become so adept in their use of digital literacy it would be a shame not to utilise these new skills of the boys and the staff. Attached to the Wetherbuzz is the draft letter that was to go to all Year 6-8 parents last term (before the onset of Covid) that has now been adapted to include all year groups. I just add though that this letter remains 'draft' as whilst we have ordered enough for three year groups, adding to this order for a device that the whole world is trying to buy, might not be possible for September – we will though, do our best.

We have got to a great place with our remote learning and whilst we look forward to welcoming Year 6 back after half term and hopefully subsequent year groups thereafter, it will continue for the majority of boys and we appreciate that we can always refine the practice that we offer. Alpha Plus have set up a survey to all parents in their schools and colleges that they would like parents to contribute to. It will take no more than few minutes to complete but will give them important feedback on the provision at Wetherby Prep. Those parents with children at other schools can use the same link but will have to complete the survey separately for each institution.






### *Citizen of the Week*





The boys then had to put their skills of calculating surface area and volume to the test!




Hugo has come up with 'Hugo bar' and calculated surface area, volume and costs of production!

### SpaceX: NASA target May 27<sup>th</sup> for 1st Crew Dragon test flight with astronauts



The first flight of NASA astronauts from U.S. soil in nearly nine years has a launch date: May 27.

The mission will launch astronauts Bob Behnken and Doug Hurley to the International Space Station on a SpaceX Crew Dragon spacecraft in a final test flight for NASA. The mission, Demo-2, will mark NASA's first crew launch from American soil since the agency's space shuttle fleet retired in July 2011.


Lift-off is set for 4:32 p.m. EDT (20:32 GMT) from historic Launch Pad 39A — the same site used for NASA's Apollo and shuttle missions — at NASA's Kennedy Space Center in Florida.





## DRAGON VERSION 2

Revealed on May 29, 2014, SpaceX's Dragon version 2 capsule can carry a crew of seven astronauts to the International Space Station. The reusable Dragon is expected to last for up to 10 flights before needing significant refurbishment. The capsule lands on the ground using its 16,000-pound thrust SuperDraco rocket engines and landing legs, with parachutes also on board as a backup.

# Test Your Dominant Side

## What you'll need:

- A pen or pencil
- Paper or a notepad to write your findings on
- An empty tube (an old paper towel tube is good)
- A cup of water
- A small ball (or something soft you can throw)

## Instructions:

### Eye tests:

- Which eye do you use to wink?
- Which eye do you use to look through the empty tube?
- Extend your arms in front of your body. Make a triangle shape using your fore fingers and thumbs. Bring your hands together, making the triangle smaller (about the size of a coin is good). Find a small object in the room and focus on it through the hole in your hands (using both eyes). Try closing just your left eye and then just your right, if your view of the object changed when you closed your left eye mark down 'left', if it changed when you closed your right eye mark down 'right'.

### Hand/Arm tests:

- Which hand do you use to write?
- Pick up the cup of water, which hand did you use?
- Throw the ball, which arm did you use?

### Foot/Leg tests:

- Run forward and jump off one leg, which did you jump off?
- Drop the ball on the ground and kick it, which foot did you use?

## Introduction

Check out this cool experiment that will teach you more about how your body and brain work together. Test your dominant side by completing a series of challenges. Which hand do you write with? Which foot do you kick with? Do you have a dominant eye? Do you throw with one side of your body but kick with the other? Are you ambidextrous? Answer these questions and much more with this fun science experiment for kids.

## What's Happening

So what side do you favor? Are you left handed or right handed? Left footed or right footed? Is your right eye dominant or is it your left?



Around 90% of the world's population is right handed. Why most people favor the right side is not completely understood by scientists. Some think that the reason is related to which side of your brain you use for language. The right side of your body is controlled by the left side of your brain, and in around 90% of people the left side of the brain also controls language.


Others think the reason might have more to do with culture. The word 'right' in English is associated with being correct and doing the right thing while the word 'left' originally meant 'weak'. Favoring the right hand may have become a social development as more children were taught important skills by right handed people and various tools were designed to be used with the right hand. Around 80% of people are right footed and 70% favor their right eye. These percentages are lower than those who are right handed and this could be because your body has more freedom of choice in choosing its favored foot and eye than that of its favored hand. In other words you are more likely to be trained to use your right hand than your right foot and even more so than your right eye.






