From the Headmaster



Dear Parents,

A year ago today turned out to be the last day in school of the Spring Term before we embarked on a week of remote learning. A lot has changed since then but a year on, we are looking far more positively towards the Summer Term than we were back then and our educational practice has changed immeasurably. During the Easter holidays in 2020, we delivered over 100 pieces of hardware, in fact our entire school stock of laptops and iPads, to Wetherby Prep households and remotely taught and acquainted our staff with the use of Teams. A year later, all the boys are using the same devices, are on the same platform and all members of our community are Teams experts. This technology is not without its drawbacks and we're learning all the time in how best to facilitate this in our school environment but no one can deny that we have come a long way in a year and these past twelve months have been anything but wasted from an educational perspective.

With two successful school-based weeks behind us and still no positive test results in our community, there is a definite sense of optimism for the next term and beyond. There is no drop in school roll (in fact a small increase) for September, 2021 Exit Group looks set to be our best yet, exciting staff recruitment for 2021 has been completed (and will be announced in the normal way next week) and enhancements to the school building and our facilities here planned out for the summer holidays. Only two weeks back but it feels longer and more established. The boys and staff have settled back into old routines, established practices and a sense of normalcy that so many yearned for. Even my train seems to have got busier this week and a few more food outlets and shops have reopened at Euston...Wetherby Prep and London are reawakening, and getting ready for a fun summer...and one with more prospects than this time last year.

We finish the week with every boy having spoken at least one line of Shakespeare's work this week! Until next year...





































Bobby Fischer

The greatest player in the history of chess? I don't think so. The most charismatic and controversial, definitely. One of a list of people I would have loved to have taught Maths to.

- Chess prodigy at the age of 6
- Youngest ever US Chess Champion at the age of 14
- Youngest ever Grandmaster at the age of 15
- IQ 181
- World Chess Champion 1972

Incredible facts about a genius who found chess. But like many geniuses Bobby Fischer was deeply flawed, reclusive and became increasingly deranged.

His chess career was over by the age of 29.





There have been and will be many films, books and series chronicling the rise and decline of Bobby Fischer. The documentary 'Bobby Fischer against the world' is my favourite whilst the film 'Pawn Sacrifice' is rubbish

The Queens Gambit series echoes Bobby Fischer in many ways and indeed the author of the book on which the series was based, Walter Tevis, was a great fan of Bobby.

Bobby died in exile in Iceland in 2008. In an obituary in The Times, the headline, 'Death of a madman driven sane by chess', summed it all up beautifully. What a player he was.

What if Planet Nine is a baby black hole?

They may not be black or holes.



Some astronomers believe there is a massive planet, far beyond the orbit of Neptune, orbiting the sun — but after years of searching, scientists have not found this theoretical world, which they've dubbed "Planet Nine."

This has spurred theorists to consider a radical hypothesis: Perhaps Planet Nine is not a planet but rather a small black hole that might be detectable from the theoretical radiation emitted from its edge, so-called Hawking radiation.

Space Calendar 2021:

Rocket launches, sky events, missions & more!

March

March 19: The **Soyuz MS-17** crew spacecraft, which brought three Expedition 64 crewmembers to the **International Space Station** in October 2020, will relocate from the Russian Rassvet module to the Poisk module. NASA astronaut Kate Rubins and Russian cosmonauts Sergey Ryzhikov and Sergey Kud-Sverchkov will undock from Rassvet at 12:43 p.m. EST (1743 GMT) and will dock with Poisk at 1:13 p.m. EST (1813 GMT). **Watch it live**

March 19: Conjunction of the moon and Mars. The waxing crescent moon will swing about 2 degrees to the south of Mars in the evening sky.

March 20: Vernal Equinox. Today marks the first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere and the first day of autumn in the Southern Hemisphere.

March 25: A Russian **Soyuz rocket** will launch 36 satellites into orbit for the <u>OneWeb</u> internet constellation. It will lift off from the Vostochny Cosmodrome in Siberia. **Watch it live**

March 28: The full moon of March, known as the **Full Worm Moon**, arrives at 2:48 p.m. EDT (1817 GMT).

March 28: Venus <u>reaches its greatest brightness</u> in its 2021 evening apparition, shining brightly at magnitude -3.9. Catch the planet just above the western horizon at sunset.

LAST UPDATED March 13: These dates are subject to change, and will be updated throughout the year as firmer dates arise.




